## CLIMBING TRIP STARTS WITH A BANG

13 climbers showed up Sat. Sept. 23 (the first day of hunting season) for an exploratory trip to the Needles. All published information seemed to list only routes of 5.7 and above. As it turned out there are many things of all levels that need only to be identified. Sat. AM saw Kaplan & Callow as well as Neuner & Baker on Charlitan Needle. Ripley & Fried found a good beginners route on Magician. Others climbed various unidentified routes.

Sun. a party (Russ, Bagdon & DeRusha) went to nearby Dome Rock and reported it to be worthy of a trip in itself. Sun. saw Abe & Helen Siemand do a route on the Magician as did Baker & Neuner.

After the climb ended on Sunday a group scouted the area of Kern Slab near Kernville deciding that it also might be worth a trip. All of the climbing areas have campgrounds nearby, and are within driving distance of stores, restaurants, and even motels. Some campgrounds are near to fishing or horseback riding, and all offer hiking (outside of hunting season). Future trips to these areas will probably be popular with non-climbing family members as well as climbers.

# NORTH AMERICAN HINDU KUSH EXPEDITION-NOSHAQ

# July 1 to August 12, 1978

As an escape from the mosquitoes, high water and soft snow of the Sierra, Ski Mountaineer members, Mary Omberg, Sam Roberts and Mark Goebel traveled to Afghanistan for a climb of Noshaq, elevation 24,580 feet. Other participants were Sheldon Moomaw, leader, Laguna Niguel; Kesler Teter, Colorado; Jack Lewis, Washington; and Berhnard Ehmann, British Columbia. The expedition was endorsed by the American Alpine Club, and this greatly assisted us in obtaining the necessary permits from the red-tape enshrouded Afghan government.

Afghanistan is a land of great contrast, both in the physical aspects of the land, and its people. There are great deserts, towering mountains, and lush agriculture bordered by totally barren hillsides. The people are made up of many cultures, and it would be hard to describe a typical Afghan. This is a country which has felt the footsteps of invaders from Alexander the Great, to the Russians of today.

After a week in Kabul, the Afghan capital, gathering permits and supplies, we departed for the Hindu Kush riding on a truckload of tea. This  $3\frac{1}{2}$  day ride traversed an 11,000 foot pass, great rivers, narrow roads perched on cliffs, and a number of unstable looking bridges.

Following a two day hike to base camp at 15,000, we acclimatized for a few days, and then all but Berhnard and Jack (they climbed a lower but technical peak) started up Nosaq. It was a non-technical route, except for 500 feet of 4th class just below the 23,000 foot Camp III. Moving our camps as we moved up, we used 8 days to reach Camp III with a few rest and storm delays. On July 27th, all 5 started for the summit in windy but clear weather. The route was on snow most of the way, and like many peaks, there were 2 false summits along the way. Finally in mid-afternoon, Sam, Mary and I reached the summit along with clouds and falling snow. Retracing our steps, we found Sheldon and Kes climbing very slowly, and since it was late, they returned to Camp III where we all fell right into our bags.

## Noshaq

About noon the next day, those who had reached the summit began descending to base camp, while Sheldon and Kes remained for a second try at the summit. On the 29th, Swiss climbers reported seeing them slowly starting out again.

During the evening of the 31st, a light was observed from base camp descending the slopes of Noshaq. After a long wait, 2 exhausted Austrian climbers appeared out of the darkness, and they told of coming from Camp III, and that one American was dead! On their route to the summit, they had discovered Sheldon's body at the base of a 600' couloir leading down from the summit ridge, and there was no sign of Kes. Subsequently, the area above Camp III was searched by Berhnard, and he confirmed that Kes was missing and presumed dead.

Although we will never know exact details, the tragic loss was probably contributed to by a combination of fatigue and decreased judgement brought on by the high altitude, and possibly poor visibilty.

On August 4th, with one last look up towards the summit and our lost companions, our small group began the long journey home. (MG)

#### YOSEMITE VALLEY

20 climbers and 8 non-climbing guests enjoyed mild, clear and beautiful weather over Columbus Day weekend. Besides the evening sessions of reminiscences, anecdotes and self adulatory (or deprecatory) climbing yarns-- around a campfire or over food and beverage, there was a lot of climbing. Most active were Scott Luther and Bill Rubin who polished off the Grack, Harry Daley, The Cow- Left, and the Nutcracker-- all in the 5.8 range. Randy Sheaff and Harry McKellop were also busy: The Grack, Harry Daley and a good start on Upper Catheral Spire-- the first pitch, they report, now being a 5.10ish (up from 5.9) due to key flakes having fallen off. The biggest climb was Royal Arches by Ray and Doug Beal, who also did (with Ed Nissen) the shorter but harder Arches Terrace. Andy Fried, in a day and a half, climbed Monday Morning Slab- Right and the Grack with Bill Spina and a left start- right finish variation of Harry Daley with Len Hall. Nick Clinch, Bill Spina and Fred Wing spent an invigorating but frustrated day on Star King. The area and peak were magnificent. But they lacked any wired nuts and were told by a descending party that one was essential. So, they backed off the summit. The most popular route was Monday Morning Slab-Right: 5 ropes. Three of them met at the top and shared the same rappel line.

For John Clarke and Brian Rennie it was the best of times and the worst of times. They enjoyed doing Monday Morning Slab, Saturday (what happened to Sunday), and the Cow- Center on Sunday. Then, not content, they set off in the late afternoon for Lunch Ledge (on Washington's Column), planning to rap off when necessary. Then came the bad stuff. Brian, rapping over a lip, got his right hand wedged between the taunt rope and a sharp rock edge and received deep cuts on all four knuckles, requiring 10 stitches on the little finger- performed by a young doctor, at the Valley Hospital, who was very sympathic, being a climber herself. But back to the descent. The raps done, John, while descending loose talus in the dark, suffered a bad sprain in his right ankle. The x-ray revealed no fracture. They'll be on the mend-- we hope-- but off the rock for a while.

Several climbers enjoyed a visit by Jim Endo, who's been in the Valley for the past month. (FW)
